The Grainger Museum receives research enquiries from all over the world seeking to access the rich and varied collection. The collection catalogue is available online on the Museum's website (www.grainger.unimelb.edu.au) and material from the collection is made available to researchers in the Museum's reading room.

Where researchers are unable to attend the Museum in person, they may wish to engage a private records agent and researcher to undertake research at the Museum on their behalf.

To facilitate access to the collection in this way, the Museum maintains a list of individuals who can be contacted to undertake research of this kind. Whilst the Museum attempts to keep this list up to date and accurate, it is wholly dependent upon the private records agents and researchers for the information therein.
